Welcome to the 10th edition of *The Transformer* - an update from the Smart Transformation Project.

Smart Transformation works to future-proof the communities of Dysart and Moranbah, as we face the rapid technological changes being brought about by the Fourth Industrial Revolution (or 4IR for short).

Smart Transformation operates independently, with support from BHP Mitsubishi Alliance (BMA), and is driven by the two towns' Smart Transformation Advisory Councils and Youth Advisory Council. Council members capture feedback and advice from the communities they call home, to direct resources and effort into projects important to local residents.

Housing availability a focus for Summit

Smart Transformation will host a summit to help address the cost and availability of local accommodation, with key public and private sector stakeholders invited to attend.

To be held in Moranbah in November, the Smart Transformation Housing Summit is supported by Isaac Regional Council with invitees from local industry as well as government agencies, developers and community groups.

Smart Transformation Project Lead Richelle Toshack said the Housing Summit would drive collaborative solutions to the challenges of accommodation in the local market.

"We need to figure out what we can do – this Summit will be a rare opportunity to get everyone together to discuss the best options," Richelle said.

"Bringing everyone to the table is what Smart Transformation does, so we can all find more sustainable long-term solutions."







Make a smart transformation and move to the Basin

Smart Transformation has launched a project to encourage new residents to make the move to Dysart and Moranbah.

Smart Transformation, working to future-proof the two towns, operates two Advisory Councils and both have prioritised attracting new people into their communities as a key enabler to community and economic growth.

In response, and with the support of BHP Mitsubishi Alliance (BMA), Smart Transformation prepared two videos highlighting

the lifestyle and work opportunities on offer, showcasing the services, shopping and schools of the two communities, and the incredible people who call the towns home.

Childcare Alliance gets down to business

A board, headed by Moranbah STAC member Melissa Westcott, has developed its strategic plan and has begun engaging with local centres in Dysart and Moranbah on implementation.

Improving childcare services was identified as a key priority for both Dysart and Moranbah STACs, with BMA subsequently funding the project.

Innovative Futures steering committee meets

Smart Transformation has brought together local and regional leaders to consider future economic opportunities for Isaac and the pathway to enable them.

The Smart Transformation Innovative Futures Project is studying economic development options with a 10 to 20 year timeline, in order to support regional planning.

A study is underway led by management consultants GWI and overseen by a steering committee with members from Isaac Regional Council, Greater Whitsunday Alliance, Central Queensland University, BHP, Regional Development Australia and the Resources Centre of Excellence.

The steering committee met in late September to give consideration to early study findings and provide insights into the forward plan.

The final report is now in development and expected to be delivered in November 2022.

STAC Profile - Anthony Edwards

Moranbah State School Principal Anthony Edwards is notching up three years as a Smart Transformation Advisory Council member and says Smart Transformation has come a long way.

"When we started the STACs, the focus was around automation and how our communities could adapt to new and different jobs in the mining industry," Anthony says.

"A lot of the projects we've been working on are underway or completed, so now we are looking at what else we can achieve going forward."

Anthony says his three years as a member of the Moranbah STAC have been empowering.

The job's not done, though.

"The people who live in our communities are invested in them, and we do expect the services to be provided by governments," Anthony says.
